COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Conflict is a natural and inevitable component of the human existence as we can encounter conflict in all facets of our lives and relationships. Conflict is paradoxical in that it contains the potential to yield both opportunity and danger. Communication processes are significant influences on conflict as they are the instrumental in the creation, manifestation, and management of conflict. The primary objective of this course is to introduce the literature and various topics pertinent to the study of conflict communication. Throughout the semester we will engage in an advanced study of constructive conflict management from a communicative perspective and the communicative processes associated with the manifestations and experiences of conflict across relationships, situational contexts, and cultures. Theories, methodologies, and evolving trends associated with conflict communication research are also explored.
